

The Get Food Smart TN program is a statewide initiative, administered by the Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation - Office of Policy and Sustainable Practices. It will provide Tennesseans with resources to reduce food waste and increase food recovery.


One component of Get Food Smart TN is the Recognition Program. The Recognition Program will recognize entities in one of four categories who satisfy at least 5 of up to 30 criteria under their respective category. Criteria outlined in each category are intended to reflect actions that organizations can take to reduce food waste and use food wisely.

# Get Food Smart Tennessee

- Organization must satisfy at least 5 of up to 30 criteria under their category.
- The four categories are:
  - Schools
  - Restaurants
  - Government Entities and Non-Profit Organizations
  - Grocers, Industry, Agriculture, and other Private Entities

- State Parks report recycling metrics monthly.
- Resort State Park restaurants participate in food waste reduction through diversion, donations, and composting.
- EPA regional and national recognition for food waste diversion efforts in EPA's Food Recovery Challenge program.
- New Bear Saver recycling bins for all parks offer a more uniform branding for customers.




# *Sustainable State Government – Go Green With Us*



- Go Green with Us is a technical assistance and recognition program for the Tennessee State Parks system which aims to lead by example through reducing environmental impacts associated with operations and activities at the 56 State Parks
- Points based sustainability program developed for TN State Parks
- First recognition ceremony in April 2017
- 28 of 56 parks voluntarily submitted checklist application
- 26 recognized-
  - Bronze – 17
  - Silver – 6
  - Gold – 3



# *Defining and Scoping Sustainability*

- What do you think of when you hear the word **Sustainability**?
- Sustainability has three fundamental pillars
  - Environmental – is it good for the environment?
  - Economic – is it good for the economy?
  - Social – is it good for society?
- According to the dictionary, sustainability is the avoidance of the depletion of natural resources in order to maintain an ecological balance.

# Sustainability



**Bearable (Society + Environment)** – This occurs when we are cognizant of our impact, which results in humans intentionally contributing towards a healthier environment and overall well-being.

**Equitable (Society + Economic Equitable)** This occurs when a nation's resources are used to help eradicate poverty and social inequality, and to raise the standard of living of the society.

**Viable (Economic + Environment)** – This occurs when a Nation strives to meet economic growth and development, while operations are pursued with environmental protection in mind.

# *Sustainable Resilience*

- Sustainability is the avoidance of the depletion of natural resources in order to maintain an ecological balance.
- Resilience is the capacity to recover quickly from difficulties; the ability of a substance or object to spring back into shape; elasticity.
- Sustainable resilience is the ability of communities to confront changing conditions, absorb disturbances with flexibility, and utilize existing resources and local partnerships to achieve community goals without compromising the ability of future generations to meet their own needs.

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Tennessee communities often take one or more of the following approaches:

**Recognition and Rating:** this broad-based approach utilizes a formal recognition and rating system to perform a more comprehensive baseline and to provide comprehensive recommendations for next steps toward sustainable resilience across many sectors of community life.

**Leading by Example:** local government can lead by example by identifying opportunities to change its operations and governance to support sustainable resilience in policy, practice, regulation, and legislation.

**Risk-Management, Resilience, and Emergency Planning:** Tennessee communities are required to complete hazard mitigation plans and other risk-management and emergency planning to qualify for many types of funding, including pre-disaster mitigation funds. This path provides a natural entry point for incorporation sustainability and resilience into community planning.

**Community Stakeholder-Driven:** this path addresses specific areas of community stakeholder concern through changes to policy, operation, and legislation catalyzing in action to support sustainable resilience for all residents.

# Risk-Management, Resilience, and Emergency Preparedness

UNDER CONSTRUCTION

In Tennessee, all communities are required to submit hazard mitigation plans to the Tennessee Emergency Management Agency (TEMA) in order to qualify for specific funds, such as pre-disaster mitigation funding. Other funding opportunities may require risk-management planning, emergency preparedness planning, or other disaster planning.

Does your community already have plans in place? If so, this is a natural launching point for integrating resilience and sustainability considerations into your plans to increase the positive effect of those plans.

Is your community ready to develop risk-management or hazard mitigation plans? We have some great resources to inform your planning process: from baseline assessment tools to evaluate your community's risks in the face of extreme climate events to sample hazard mitigation plans, following TEMA guidance.

Taking a holistic approach to risk-management, resilience, and emergency planning allows your community to use the same dollars more effectively – saving your community money and giving your community the better opportunity to bounce back from disasters.

## 4. Take Action

- Take visible action engaging stakeholders
- Pursue initial projects that will result in cost savings over time and which benefits can be easily conveyed to the community.
- Energy saved through LED-retrofitting
- Water conserved through use of low-flow faucets
- Green space added and/or utilized by citizens
- Improvements to water infrastructure
- Enhancing public transportation options generate metrics that are readily accessible to community members.

## 5. *Publicize*

**Informal:** Host a dashboard or scorecard with regularly updated metrics like energy savings, water conservation, number of citizens using green spaces or outdoor trails and parks, and miles citizens have logged using public or alternative transportation on your website.

The city of Rockwood provides an annual dashboard update, Chattanooga provides a regularly updated dashboard for its areas of targeted performance growth, and Knoxville provides public dashboards for specific areas of focus, such as homelessness and building blight.

**Formal:** Host public meetings to highlight progress in sustainable resilience, including effective partnerships with local organizations, businesses, and industry, and ask community stakeholders to identify continued prioritization and community goals so that you can move the needle in areas of greatest community concern.

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# Case Studies and Success Stories

## ▼ Stakeholder-Led Sustainable Resilience



### [City of Kingsport](#): population 53,374 Engaging Citizens in the Spirit of Resilience

In 2018, following its 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary year, the city was awarded for [Excellence in Government](#) by the Tennessee Municipal League for its innovative approaches to local governance through involving citizens, utilizing new technology, and cooperation among both elected officials and appointed staff. Leading up to the city's centennial anniversary in 2017,

officials established the "OneKingsport Summit," a two-day period where citizen input was gathered and an advisory committee was formed to help guide the city into the future. Five projects designed to provide a sustained economic impact and improve the quality of life for citizens were identified at the summit and are currently in progress. The city also recently established a 12-member Neighborhood Commission that advises and promotes initiatives to strengthen local neighborhoods. To better communicate with residents, Kingsport implemented "YourGov," a free service that allows residents to report non-emergency issues and service requests using the web or a smart phone. Kingsport continues to build on increasing sustainability and becoming more resilient by continually seeking input and synergy from residents to harness the Kingsport "spirit" of achievement.

# *Wildfires, Sustainability, Resilience*

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# *Risk & Resilience Strategic Planning and Community Engagement Sessions for Tennessee Communities*

- To assist Tennessee communities in performing comprehensive community needs and vulnerability evaluation with a focus on risk-management, resilience planning, environmental and public health planning, smart growth, and sustainability
- To support communities in identifying specific vulnerabilities and environmental priority areas; to assist in identifying resources and technical assistance to support a strategic action plan to address community vulnerabilities and priorities across multiple sectors; and to provide technical assistance and community engagement activities to support positive action in those priority areas.

# *Risk & Resilience Strategic Planning and Community Engagement Sessions for Tennessee Communities*

Governor Lee's Executive Order 01 requires all state agencies to identify the actions that it can take to support rural communities. TDEC's OPSP is uniquely positioned to: 1) assist communities in performing an assessment of community strengths and challenges across all sectors of community life with a focus on risk-management, resilience planning, environmental stewardship, smart growth, and sustainability, 2) identify community priorities for action, 3) perform analysis and make recommendations on financial and technical resources available to the community, and 4) engage the community, including its residents, in taking action steps to pursue community priorities.

# *Risk & Resilience Strategic Planning and Community Engagement Sessions for Tennessee Communities*

- Bi-weekly planning calls with OPSP during project period
- A tailored half-day strategic planning session, organized and facilitated by OPSP, in the community
- Report summarizing the strategic planning session, community vulnerabilities and priorities, and identification of available resources and technical assistance
- Tailored full-day action plan workshop=morning session for community leaders, afternoon community engagement
- Periodic follow-up and support
